The Indian Rupee Symbol

The Indian rupee symbol (₹) is an amalgam of both the Devanagari consonant Ra and the Latin letter "R" without the vertical bar. The design was officially released by the Government of India on July 15, 2010.

Commonwealth Games 2010

The Commonwealth Games 2010, or the XIX Commonwealth Games, were held in Delhi, India, from October 3 – 14, 2010. A total of 6,081 athletes from 71 Commonwealth nations and dependencies competed in 21 sports and 272 events. It was the largest international multi-sport event to be staged in Delhi and India, eclipsing the Asian Games in 1951 and 1982.



The opening and closing ceremonies were held at the Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium, the main stadium of the event. It was the first time that the Commonwealth Games were held in India. The official mascot of the Games was Shera and the official song of the Games, “Jiyo Utho Badho Jeeto”, was composed by celebrated Indian musician A R Rahman. For the sixth consecutive time, Australia topped the tally with 177 medals, including 74 gold medals. India performed exceptionally well and took the second position with 101 medals, including 38 gold medals.

Do you worry about obesity? Stop worrying and try this

The recipe for this supposedly miraculous weight loss aid is very simple. Combine one teaspoon honey with half teaspoon cinnamon powder and boil in one cup of water. MOTHER TERESA – The Saint of the Gutters



Mother Teresa (born Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu) was born on August 27, 1910 in Macedonia. She joined the Sisters of Loreto, an Irish community of nuns with missions in India, at the age of 18.

Mother Teresa came to India in the year 1931 and taught geography and catechism at St Mary's High School in Calcutta till 1948. However, the prevailing poverty in Calcutta made a deep impact on her mind and, in 1948, she received permission from her superiors to leave the convent school and devote herself to work among the poorest of the poor in the slums of Calcutta.

She started an open-air school for homeless children. Soon she was joined by volunteers and also received financial support from the church and the municipal authorities. Mother Teresa received permission from the Vatican to start her own order called The Missionaries of Charity in 1950. It began as a small Order with 12 members in Calcutta, but today it has more than 4,000 nuns running orphanages, AIDS hospices, charity centres, and care shelters for refugees, the disabled, the aged, the alcoholics, the poor, the homeless and the victims of floods, epidemics and famine all over the world. The "Missionaries of Charity" order has a presence in more than 100 countries. Mother Teresa stepped down as the head of Missionaries of Charity on March 1997 and died on September 5th the same year.

Mother Teresa was a great servant of humanity. Her selfless work among the poverty-stricken people is an inspiration for people

all over the world. She was honoured with a number of awards and distinctions including the Bharat Ratna (1980). She was also declared a Saint on March 9th, 2009.



News: Digital Talking Library

Vision rehabilitation centres of LVPEI is expanded its audio library services to set up a new, sophisticated Digital Audio Library with support from GE Volunteers — Hyderabad Council on October 29, 2010. The library will help in preparing high quality audio index books for multiple uses and can be converted into CDs, tapes, and MP3 files as required.

These audio books would be distributed to schools and colleges with visually impaired students on their rolls. The Centre is also planning to give online access and downloading options to individual users. A range of audio books on general curriculum, competitive entrance examination material, general knowledge and children's stories is prepared with the help of trained volunteers.
